Mostly the work done by the College, initiatives taken by the college and objectives reached by the College are brought to the notice of the College Governing Council in a systematic manner. Mostly every initiative, before being executed is documented on a note sheet which begins (i) at the end of the Organising Secretary/Accountant/Teacher (whosoever comes up with a proposal) (ii) is sent to the Bursar of the College for his opinion about the financial support system available (iii) is forwarded to the Principal for his opinion/approval and recommendation, and (iv) finally forwarded to the Secretary of the College for sanction. If the project demands so the note sheet is sent to the President of the College for his information and approval. Generally a Governing Council meeting is organised 34 times in a year, and all such details are brought to the notice of College Governing Council as "Action Taken Report". Before the commencement of Academic Session in July every year, a meeting of the staff council is held by the Principal with all the teachers, in which a plan of action is enunciated and agreed upon for delivery to the learners. Every teacher is assigned a particular portion in a particular time-frame (i) for curriculum delivery (ii) for organising class tests (iii) for organising internal examinations, and (iv) evaluation. The Secretary of the staff council collects the progress report every 6 months, and hands over the details to the Co-ordinator of the IQAC. If its necessary, various meetings of the Staff Council are held during each semester, so that every issue arising out of the plan can be addressed and sorted out.

Utilizing physical academic and support facilities, i.e, laboratory, library, sports, computers, classrooms etc. is done in accordance with a master time table prepared by the College. Provision is made in such a way that there should be optimum utilization of the physical facilities available at the College. As for laboratory, the College has got 3 Computer laboratories with 75 systems. Besides it has developed a psychology laboratory. There is a provision in the College time table that students other than students of Computer Science are also admitted to the Computer laboratories at least twice in a week. Such students who opt for learning Computer Skills are divided into groups of 40 students who are taken to the laboratory for skill development. All such students who opt for Computer courses of Spoken Tutorial programme run by IIT. Bombay are given online teaching and training so as to make the students learn faster The College campus is Wi-Fi enabled, which provides students internet facility. Almost 90 of the students who joined these classes passed the examination conducted by I.I.T, Bombay are given certificates which is a value addition to their C.V. as well. Anyone willing to learn computer skills is not denied the facility. The procedure and policies thus followed are quite popular with the parents and the students which derive much benefit from these laboratories. AS for psychology laboratory each student admitted to psychology class is allowed to work in the laboratory. The time table of such students is so organized as to make the optimum utilization of the psychology lab, with the assurance that no student is denied access to the psychology lab. The College library is much sought after place for students .It has adequate books, many of which are issued to the students from time to time. However there is still scope for enrichment with new books and journals purchased from time to time. There is also a reading room in the College library which is neat and tidy, and can seat 50 students at a time .Students are generally happy with the college library .Many of the students are initiated to the library by teachers who want the students to utilize the library with utmost sincerity. The College has got a pitch of cricket, a volleyball court ,table tennis and certain other indoor games. The College participates in most of the games and sporting events organised by the University in which talent of the students are chiselled and polished many of the students are provided opportunity and some get selected even for the University squad. Every year some money is set apart in the college Budget for maintenance of laboratories, library, computers, classrooms

and sporting events. A token fee is charged from every student at the time of admission, which is utilized for appointment of coaches, providing opportunities for participating at various levels. ## 7.2 – Best Practices

Best Practices:01 1.Title of the Practice: A performance Enrichment Programme for the budding talent in Arts and cultural activities: opening of the Department of Creativity 2.Goal As the title suggests the main objective is to expose our students and teachers of the available talent in the field of Music, Dance, theatre events(one-Act Play ,skit, Mime and Mimicry),Fine Arts and Literary Activities(Debate, Elocution, Quiz etc.)so that quality becomes the defining feature in the above activities throughout their life. The idea is to provide such training and tools to the students as may chisel and polish their talent to create the quality brand needed by the society. 3.Context About seven years ago it was felt by the members of the Arts and culture society of the college in one of its meeting in July 2011 that the students of the college who have performed so consistently well at the University inter-college Youth Festivals need more attention and better training than just preparing them for a month or so by hiring some coaches from outside. Quite a few of our students have been selected every year in the University team for participation at the higher level, i.e., in the Zonal inter university youth festival. Some of our students have won prizes even at the national level. It was decided, therefore, to enrich and develop this department for better results. 4.Practice As mentioned above, the idea was to make available quality training and teaching to our students in fine Arts and performing arts as also in literary events throughout the year. But the college did not have a Department of Music or a Department of Fine Arts or a Department of Performing Arts. Against this backdrop, a small initiative was planned, and the Department of Creativity was started in February 2012 under the leadership of a senior teacher who had been associated with the preparation of the team for Youth Festival, and was also the manager of the college Youth Festival team since 2008. Eminent coaches and teachers of high reputation have been enlisted as part-time teachers, and are invited for training and teaching. They are mostly teachers from the sister institutions of the district, or such eminent artistes who run their own schools or organisations. Even some of our own alumni who have done us proud in the past by their sterling performance have associated with us as coaches. Classes are organised throughout the year, and it is tried to provide teaching and training to all budding talent available in the college in such skills as Music, Dance, Drama, Skit, Mimicry, Mime, Fine Arts and literary activities. The students enrolled in the department are given certificates on the successful completion of their course/training. With the coming of the new University into being, it seems possible to have a full diploma course (two-semester programme) in "Art and Culture" in the College in near future, which will be an important milestone. 5.Evidence of success This Department has been functioning for about seven years now and there is no hesitation in saying that outcome has been encouraging. It can be appreciated that the students trained by this department have inculcated better value system than others. The functioning of this department has made a positive impact on the performance of the college. The students do not only learn the specific skills but they are also groomed to be nice people in these classes. The teacher -taught relationship in this department is very healthy and close-unit. In 2018,the College team was adjudged "Champions by the University" ",and our students have bagged prizes even at the zonal level, and at the national level.They were also invited at Raj Bhawan,Ranchi during celebration of Baishakhi Programme Best Practices 02 Title of the Practice: Capacity building programme for the



students and faculty members: Guru Nanak Dev Lecture series in 2017. The Lecture series in the name of Guru Nanak Dev Goal In 2017, members of the IQAC felt that a lecture series be started in the name of the great guru after whom the college is named. With the success and the attention which the College received during the National seminars organised by it was quite encouraging. It was decided to invite scholars and intellectuals for delivering lectures in the College. It was felt that this would build the capacity of the teachers as also initiate the students to intellectual and cerebral activities. Context Although teachers keep going for refresher courses, orientation programmes and other intellectual activities at various places, it was felt that inviting renowned scholars and learned teachers for lectures on various subjects should be truly capacity building. Besides having such programmes in the College would encourage the students also to such intellectual activities. With this end in view a senior teacher of the College was entrusted the job of co-ordinating with all departments for organising lectures in different subjects. Practice Guru Nanak Dev lecture series has come to stay as one of the leading best practices in the institution. It has indeed gone very well with the students and the members of the faculty. Two lectures were delivered during the year by: 1. Dr.R.N.Sinha,Prof.(Retd.)and former head department of English,St.Xavier's College, Ranchi delivered a lecture on "New bearings in English Literature "on 24th January,2018 2.Dr.Sajal Mukherjee,Orof. And Head Department of Economics,Vinoba Bhave University,Hazaribag delivered a talk on "Where are the Jobs :Decoding India's Jobless Growth" The two lectures were organised and delivered in great style,and there was a huge response from the students and the teachers. As mentioned above, with the success of this programme, the college has been encouraged to organise.

True to the vision, priority and thrust of the institution, the College has tried to impart holistic education among the students as also to make them imbibe the virtues of and values of responsible citizens. It is important that the graduates from the College carry themselves with lofty ideals and practical wisdom to walk into the streets of life with their head held high It is indeed very important that curricular aspects are properly looked after in the institution for the knowledge and skill development of the students. Throughout the year, students have been included, one batch after another, in the spoken tutorial programme of MHRD delivered through IIT, Bombay of which the College has been the 1st FOSS centre in the state of Jharkhand. This enhances the capacity of the students and combined with the certificates they receive from IIT. Bombay makes them more confident and employable. Students are also admitted to the exclusive club of Communicative English Classes, which also contributes to the shaping of their personality. But all this is not enough for what we call holistic development of our students. The College has tried to provide ample opportunities to them for various kinds of leadership programmes through the extension activities carried out by a very active N.S.S. and N.C.C. units. They are provided teaching and training in the field of art and culture- music and dance, theatre activities, literary activities such as debate, elocution and quiz competitions, activities in fine arts like sculpture, Rangoli, clay modelling. This is true that the hidden and the budding talent among the students is chiselled and polished through these activities. The initiative of the I.Q.A.C. to introduce lectures of distinguished and learned



teacher from outside has shown to be paying rich dividends. We have two lectures organised by the Department of English and Department of Economics during the past year. Apart from this more than half a dozen workshops were organised which included career counselling workshops. The workshop "How to Read Poems" will stand out as a new perspective was introduced to the students of literature. The vision of the College "Pursuit of Excellence by Imparting teaching and training to the young" has been tried to be achieved through the above activities with the objective that the students appeared to be cut above and different has been achieved.

### **8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year**

2019-20 has been planned to be a remarkable year for the College. Since this would be the Golden Jubilee Year. The College was founded (conceptualised) on 25th November 1969. It was decided by the College Management to have celebrations throughout the year, beginning from Feb 2019 to Feb 2020. 1) The IQAC had proposed that there should be some 8 lectures under the aegis of Guru Nanak Dev Lecture Series during this year as also two national seminars on 1) Some subjects related with English Literature, and 2) Another related with Guru Nanak Studies. Also it was decided to start the Golden Jubilee Celebration with a grand function of music and dance in which all the former managers and people associated with the College be invited and honoured. Appropriately the function was named "Nostalgia" which was organised on 23rd Feb 2018. It was decided further that there would be another cultural celebration in Feb 2020. The College management had sanctioned a sum of Rs.10 lakhs as financial support for the above. 2) It was decided to peruse the opening of 1) P.G. Studies in Commerce and 2) Starting teaching B.B.A. with the University. It is likely that these two programmes would be started in the College with effect from this academic session. 3) Since a department of creativity in the College has been largely successful in providing skill and training to budding artists of the College and keeping in view the kind of talent that they have, it was decided to apply to the University for starting a diploma Course in Art and Culture as self-financed course, which will provide the College with enough resources to make it possible to enhance its area of activity in the field of Performing Arts and Fine Arts. The Dept. of Creativity will finally grow into the Department of Art and Culture.
